



**HS1-2018-NYS STOP-DWI Found.-00173-(088) STOP-DWI Foundation Crackdown  
Progress Report: October 1, 2017 – March 31, 2018**

Through this grant, STOP-DWI Programs across the state were able to develop and coordinate comprehensive enforcement efforts within their counties. Specific crackdown periods were selected based on the increased potential for impaired driving to occur to include; Halloween, Thanksgiving, December Holidays, Super Bowl, St. Patrick's Day, Memorial Day, July 4<sup>th</sup> and late summer into Labor Day. Each county develops multi-agency efforts utilizing saturation patrols and checkpoints to detect and arrest impaired drivers. Each crackdown involved having a local DRE on call. (This report will not contain St. Patrick's Day crackdown results as they were not available at the time of filing.)

Halloween – Data is that provided as of April 2, 2018. Cattaraugus, Cayuga, Chautauqua, Chemung, Dutchess, Erie, Greene, Jefferson, Madison, Monroe, Montgomery, Oneida, Ontario, Orange, Oswego, Putnam, Rensselaer, Rockland, Saratoga, Schenectady, Schoharie, Seneca, Steuben, Suffolk, Sullivan, Tompkins, Warren, Washington, Westchester, Wyoming and Yates Counties did not participate in this crackdown.

- Participation included: 19 counties with a total of 62 agencies working 702.75 hours during the six day crackdown for a total of 13 DWI arrests and 1 DWAI-Drug arrests.

Thanksgiving – Data is that provided as of April 2, 2018. Allegany, Cattaraugus, Chemung, Dutchess, Greene, Madison, Monroe, Oneida, Oswego, Putnam, Rensselaer, Schenectady, Schoharie, Suffolk, Sullivan, Tompkins, Warren, Wyoming and Yates did not participate in this crackdown.

- Participation included: 30 counties with a total of 89 agencies working 1404.42 hours during the five day crackdown for a total of 42 DWI arrests and 6 DWAI-Drug arrests.

Holiday Season – Data is that provided as of April 2, 2018. Cattaraugus, Cayuga, Greene, Monroe, Oneida, Orange, Oswego, Rensselaer, Schenectady, Sullivan, Tompkins, Westchester, Wyoming and Yates Counties did not participate in this crackdown.

- Participation included: 36 counties with a total of 109 agencies working 1813.04 hours during the eighteen day crackdown for a total of 63 DWI arrests and 5 DWAI-Drug arrests.

Super Bowl – Data is that provided as of April 2, 2018. Cattaraugus, Cayuga, Chautauqua, Chemung, Chenango, Erie, Greene, Jefferson, Monroe, Montgomery, Orange, Putnam, Rensselaer, Rockland, Schenectady, Schoharie, Suffolk, Sullivan, Tompkins, Wyoming and Yates Counties either did not participate in this crackdown or had not submitted a request for reimbursement as of April 2, 2018.

- Participation included: 29 counties with a total of 83 agencies working 1056.28 hours during the four day crackdown for a total of 34 DWI arrests and 0 DWAI-Drug arrests.

Details for each crackdown, including arrest totals and amounts expended by county, are attached in four separate tables.

Crackdowns conducted in this manner enhance a higher visibility of officers on the road along with promoting the coordination of efforts between numerous agencies.



Public Information and media efforts were also coordinated throughout the state with sample press releases and digital banners for each of the crackdowns provided to all counties. Each banner could be personalized with the county name. These banners were used on social media, printed materials and for public service announcements.

DRE Callouts. Data is that provided as of April 2, 2018. DRE's from Albany, Broome, Chemung, Clinton, Cortland, Dutchess, Erie, Franklin, Genesee, Herkimer, Livingston, Madison, Monroe, Montgomery, Niagara, Oneida, Ontario, Rockland, Schenectady, St. Lawrence, Washington, Wayne Westchester, and Wyoming Counties were called out 156 times during the reporting period. The DRE agencies were reimbursed for a total of 478.50 hours, an average of 3.07 hours per callout, at an average salary of \$49.62. The average age of the subjects evaluated was 33.28 with 112 male subjects and 44 females. 145 of the 156 evaluations resulted in arrests including 131 violations of VTL 1192.4; 20 violations of VTL 511; 16 PL 220 charges and 30 PL 221 charges. There were 11 evaluations conducted based on a rule out, fatality or ongoing investigation.
